#### Decide when can you go, and for how long

Generally, people plan their trips for between one and four weeks. 

Walking safaris are most often completed as a half day excursion from your safari camp or lodge, but in some locations you have the option of taking a mobile walking safari where you walk between camps each day, looking for wildlife along the way. Walking safaris can be offered throughout Africa with some fantastic multi day walks offered in Zambia and

other unique experiences like rhino tracking in Namibia and gorilla treks in Rwanda and Uganda. Walking Safaris can usually only be done at lodges in private conservancies.

#### Fly-in Safaris

If you have a higher budget and want to cut out long distance driving, why not opt for one of our fly-in safaris which will take you from one safari camp to the next, staying in exceptional accommodation? #### The annual wildebeest migration is one of the last natural wonders left on earth and a must see on any East Africa safari.

Over two million wildebeest migrate from Tanzania's Serengeti National Park to the Maasai Mara National Reserve in Kenya. This incredible spectacle has to be seen to be believed. Predicting the movement of the large herds is not an exact science, as it is dictated by the amount of rainfall in certain areas, but by looking at historical information you can garner a good idea of where and when to start planning your encounter of this amazing event.

#### What, When and Where?

#### **December to March**

In the early part of the year the herds spread throughout the Southern Plains of the Serengeti. This is the time that the southern plains are lush and green, which gives the newborns the strength for the long journey ahead. February a great time to witness the

big herds all together as they converge for calving season. Things however, are not all cute and cuddly as predators lurk in the shadows...

#### **April to July**

April and May the herds tend to spread out a due to the long rains creating good grazing conditions. May onwards the long trek towards the Maasai Mara in Kenya is in full swing, with some of the herds following the traditional Western Corridor routing, which is where the fabled river crossings occur at the Grumeti River. The big question of survival comes up at this point... will they survive the crocodiles?

#### **August to November**

The herds are generally located in the northern reaches of the Serengeti and in the Maasai Mara and beyond. The wildebeest are met with some more opportunities for river crossings on the Mara River, before the long return journey back to the Serengeti.



The wildebeest migration also includes large numbers of zebras and gazelles as they circulate between Tanzania and Kenya looking for food



# The vast wilderness areas of Tanzania boast exceptional wildlife and offer arguably Africa's best safari destination.

Tanzania is home to Africa's highest peak, Mount Kilimanjaro, with its lowest point being the Indian Ocean that borders the west coast. It also contains seven UNESCO World Heritage sites including the Ngorongoro Conservation Area, Serengeti National Park, and the Kilimanjaro National Park. Don't forget Lake Manyara which is world famous for its flamingos and tree climbing lions!

With 16 national parks, 29 game reserves, and 40 conservation areas, you'll be able to fully immerse yourself in the African nature experience in Tanzania.

- You can never be over prepared for the sheer number of wildlife and scenic photo opportunities on safari—make sure you take at least one spare camera battery
- Visit Mto wa Mbu cultural village where 120 different tribes can be found
- For the more active traveller, why not trek to 5,895m summit of Mount Kilimanjaro, the highest free-standing mountain in the world (allow 6-8 nights depending on the route)

#### **Best Times to Visit Tanzania**

April to May is the rainy season. The southern and western circuit parks are best visited during the dry season, unlike the northern circuit parks that can be visited year-round. Tarangire is the exception with wildlife viewing considerably better in the dry season.

With some of the world's best safari destinations, the snow-capped peak of mighty Mt Kenya and superb beaches, Kenya is East Africa's most popular tourist destination.

- It is considered polite to ask before taking a photo of people or their houses sometimes a tip may be expected in return
- Whilst the Maasai people are the most well-known of Kenya's people there are more than 70 tribes in Kenya, each with their own distinctive costumes and customs
- To avoid the crowds on safari, consider staying in a lodge located on a private reserve where you can also do walks and night game drives
- The dry season (June to October) is your best bet for wildlife watching

#### Best Times to Visit Kenya

The best wildlife viewing months in Kenya are during the dry season from late June to October. The wildebeest
migration usually reaches the Maasai Mara in July and remains until October when it moves back to the
Serengeti in Tanzania. Wildlife viewing is generally good year-round.

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# Rwanda is home to breath-taking scenery, friendly and welcoming locals, and life-changing primate experiences.

The Volcanoes National Park is home to twelve families of gorillas. A two-hour drive from Rwanda's capital of Kigali, the park is a central location for exploring some distinctly Rwandan experiences. While a visit to the mountain gorillas is always a drawcard, the dramatic landscape also offers scenic hiking and opportunities to see the fascinating golden monkeys.

You can complement this magical encounter with chimpanzee trekking in the vast area of mountain rainforest of Nyungwe National Park. Nyungwe Forest is home to thirteen primate species, including chimpanzees and Ruwenzori colobus monkeys. In addition to primate encounters, there are opportunities to explore the scenic coffee growing regions and to learn about Rwanda's tragic past. For an immersive cultural encounter, visit Ruhengeri village to experience local markets and traditional dishes.

Zimbabwe's status as one of Africa's leading safari destinations was dampened in past years by political instability, but the country has re-emerged as a highlight with its spectacular natural beauty, friendly people and rich culture.

Victoria Falls – known to locals as Mosi-oa-Tunya or 'The Smoke That Thunders' – is one of the seven natural wonders of the world and the sheer power of this massive body of water plunging into the Zambezi Gorge is awe-inspiring and unforgettable. Lake Kariba, with its wildlife-rich shores and islands, is an amazing safari spot featuring spectacular sunsets, whilst Hwange National Park is known for its huge herds of elephants. A kayak trip down the Zambezi through the Mana Pools National Park will appeal to the adventurous traveller, providing close encounters with crocodiles, hippos and more.

# Known affectionately as 'the warm heart of Africa' due to its friendly people, land-locked Malawi is a place of wonders.

The crystal clear waters of Lake Malawi offer the perfect place for snorkelling or diving with quaint fishing villages dotting the tranquil shores. Malawi is incredibly diverse in its wildlife and stunning landscapes. Although Liwonde is one of Malawi's smaller parks, it is arguably the most popular of all the game parks. Malawi's principle river, the Shire, forms its western boundary and is the reserve's life blood. Hippos, crocodiles and elephants are abundant and black rhinos have been re-introduced into the area. The birding is excellent and plentiful, with Pel's fishing owl a favourite sighting.

#### Best Times to Visit Malawi

June to November has little to no rainfall making it the best time for game-viewing as wildlife is concentrated along the rivers and waterholes. December to May is lush and green from the rains, with lots of baby animals and great birding and the showers never last long.

#### Best Times to Visit Zambia

In May to September pleasant temperatures and little rainfall making it ideal for wildlife viewing. During the wet season (November to April) most parks and camps close down. The Mfuwe sector of South Luangwa NP is accessible year-round. The best time to see Victoria Falls is from June through September.

- Leave Etosha National Park until the end of your trip so you can finish off your trip and witness a variety of animals congregating around waterholes this is truly an iconic sighting that makes for a spectacular photograph
- Namibia has the highest concentration of cheetahs on earth

#### Best Times to Visit Namibia

Wildlife viewing is best in the dry season from June to October. In the wet season, animals move away from the waterholes and scatter around the park. Between December and March, some days will be humid and rain may follow, often in localised, afternoon thunderstorms.

Having separated from the African continent 60 million years ago, the island of Madagascar has evolved by itself with no influence from its motherland, leaving the country with unique wildlife and plants.

Often referred to as the 'Galapagos of Africa', this is a paradise for nature lovers where 80% of the flora and fauna are endemic, including more than 40 species of lemurs and 6 species of baobabs. The island is deeply contrasted with lush rainforests, rice fields, picturesque mountains, trees, coastline stretching 5,000km, idyllic beaches and coral reefs.

While the debate of who first settled in Madagascar may still be undecided, the mixed origins of the Malagasy people are drawn from parts of Southeast Asia, India, Africa, and the Middle East, and most predominantly Indonesia.

# Ethiopia is a country steeped in rich ancient culture. Known as the Cradle of Mankind, archaeological finds date back 3 million years.

You may not find Ethiopia at the top of most people's Africa wish-list, but it possibly should be. Thousands of years of tumultuous history are reflected throughout the architecture and culture scattered over one of the oldest countries in the world.

The western and eastern highlands are home to some uniquely Ethiopian and endangered species including the walia ibex, the mountain nyala (a type of antelope), the Simien jackal, and the gelada monkey. From Lake Tana, which is the source of the Blue Nile (Abbay) River and Ethiopia's largest lake, to the deep valleys and high plateaus of the UNESCO World Heritage-listed Simien Mountains National Park, Ethiopia is a country of wonder.

• Lake Langano is home to a variety of wildlife, including hippos, monkeys, baboons, warthogs, and a huge variety of birds

- Gondar is known for its distinctive architecture, including glorious castles that were occupied by Gondarine Kings during the 1600s

- Gelada baboons, Ethiopian wolf, Mountain Nyala, and Walia Ibex are endemic to Ethiopia

#### Best Times to Visit Ethiopia

The wet season generally lasts from June to September, with light rains beginning as early as March. The best time to travel is October to February, when the climate is both dry and sunny. At this time of year, night time temperatures can drop dramatically, so it's important to pack plenty of layers.

#### What currency should I take?

We recommend using the local currency for each country throughout Africa as you will get the most value for your money. You will be able to access ATMs in most of the large cities and high end hotels but as soon as you leave the city, ATMs become scarce. Having said that, we also recommend carrying a supply of US dollars as these are widely accepted except in South Africa and Namibia which use the Rand. Small denominations are useful for tipping. Many countries charge airport entry fees in US dollars and some national parks will only accept US dollars for their entry fees.

If you are on a high end safari, it is quite common to tip using US dollars as well. Travel money cards are also an option for your African holiday as they work the same as a bank card. If you are planning to travel with a credit card then we highly suggest having a Visa card as it is the most widely accepted. Mastercard is accepted in most major cities, however you may have difficulty using it in smaller towns. Diners Club cards and American Express are not widely accepted so have backup options.

#### What visas will I need?

Visas are required to enter many countries in Africa and the exact requirements will depend on the destinations you visit and which passport you hold. Our team will be able to quickly inform you of the requirements for your specific trip but in general it's very important that your passport has at least **six months** validity from your return date and that you have **plenty of empty pages** in your passport as Africa border guards love to stamp passports. Additionally South Africa and Botswana have very specific rules for passengers under 18 years of age who are required to present an unabridged birth certificate when entering, departing or transiting their borders.

#### Which vaccinations should I get?

A range of factors need to be considered by both yourself and your healthcare professional when assessing the need for vaccinations when planning your trip to Africa. It is recommended that you visit a travel clinic several weeks before you travel to ensure that you are fit and well to travel. In general you should consider vaccinations such as Hepatitis A and B, Typhoid, Yellow Fever (required in some destinations), Malaria (Tablets), Rabies, Tetanus, Pertussis, Diphtheria and Meningitis.

#### Will I have access to electricity and internet whilst on safari?

Most camps and lodges are situated in remote wildlife locations and are not connected to a mains electricity supply. Solar panels and generators are common and provide enough electrical power to charge batteries for cameras but you are unlikely to be able to use larger electrical devices such as hairdryers unless you are staying in a larger lodge. Due to the isolated location of camps and lodges, communication to the outside world is limited and you are unlikely to have internet access. There are exceptions to this but for many the chance to have a digital detox adds to the allure of a safari. All camps have satellite phones in case of emergencies.

#### Are children allowed on African safaris?

Africa is a great destination for children; however some safari lodges and camps do have a minimum age limit. Generally speaking, children must be over 6 years old to participate in game drives however some lodges do not accept children under 12 years old. There are exceptions to this rule, particularly if you charter your own safari vehicle and private guide and there are certain destinations and camps that are designed with families in mind.

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
